BOOKING TEE TIMES

Website - To obtain access to the members' book now section of the Club website as opposed to the visitor booking page, members must log in with their membership number and password provided by the pro shop.

App – Members can also download the 'BRS Golf' App to make bookings using the same log in detail.

RUNNING OF THE CLUB

The Club is a proprietary Club, the day-to-day running of the Club is the responsibility of the Manager with the Head Professional and Head Greenkeeper and their staff reporting to him. The Manager is responsible for business and administrative aspects of the Club and reports to the Directors at regular management meetings.

The Captain is the social focus of the Club with the Competition Secretary responsible for organising and running competitions.

The Committee are responsible for:

- a. Organisation of Club golf competitions and matches.
- b. General Rules and Procedures.
- c. Rules for competitions.

The Committee holds regular meetings to discuss the latest developments at the club. Should you wish to raise a point to be discussed at these meetings, there is a members' suggestion book left in the porch of the clubhouse entrance for you to leave your suggestion or to contact any committee member.

An Annual General Meeting in January each year. Prior to the AGM members are invited to make nominations for posts of Treasurer, Committee Secretary, Competition Secretary and three ordinary Committee Members. Proposers, Seconders and Nominees must be full members of Lydd Golf Club. A form for nominations is posted on the Club noticeboard one month prior to the date of the AGM.

The Veterans Section has its own Officers, Committee and AGM.

ETIQUETTE

Lydd Golf Club is a friendly and welcoming Club. However, we do ask that members and visitors adhere to the guidelines below both on and off the course:

Course – Proper golfing attire is always required.

- Trousers. (No tracksuit / jogging bottoms, combat trousers or jeans)
- Shirts with collars and sleeves. (No football shirts / vests allowed)
- Golf shoes not trainers
- Smart fitted shorts
- Golf shoes are allowed to be worn in the clubhouse and on the driving range. However please ensure you have firstly brushed off excess grass outside using the machine provided at the back of the pro shop.

Members and visitors are asked to follow the dress code applied by the Club and to advise their guests playing the course. The Club encourages a reasonable standard of dress in the Clubhouse and on the driving range, jeans are allowed. Staff may refuse admission to anyone dressed inappropriately.

Mobile Phones - Observe etiquette and don't let your mobile be a distraction for other players or customers.

SPIRIT OF THE GAME

Golf is played, for the most part, without supervision of a referee or umpire. The game relies on the integrity of the individual to show consideration for other players and to abide by the rules. All players should conduct themselves in a disciplined manner, always demonstrating courtesy and sportsmanship, irrespective of how competitive they may be. This is the spirit of the game of golf.

SAFETY

General Safety Points

- Always consider your safety and that of your playing partners, fellow players, greens staff and members of the public.
- You are responsible personally for any injury or damage that you cause, and you should have personal liability insurance sufficient to cover any injuries to yourself, fellow players, members of the public and damage to property.
- DO NOT play a shot if fellow players are within range especially if visibility is impaired.
- DO NOT play a shot if greens staff are working ahead wait until they have waved you on and stood clear.
- DO NOT tee off in foggy conditions if you cannot see the green on the 1st hole.
- Observe the safety instructions for Buggies on the course.

Safety on the Course

- Shout FORE should you hit your ball onto another hole especially when over the mounds or trees on the course and you are unable to see who is on the other side.
- Ensure players are out of reach on any dogleg holes such as the 9th before teeing off.
- Beware of stray balls from the driving range left of the 18th hole.

Pace of Play

Golfers, golf clubs and competition organisers have differing views on what constitutes acceptable pace of play, but they are all agreed that slow play detracts from the enjoyment of the game for far too many players. Few players complain about the game being too quick. There is a responsibility therefore on all players and administrators to ensure that golf is played at a good pace, and a pace appropriate to the course being played. Factors that may influence what is considered an appropriate pace may be the difficulty of the course, distances between tees, the weather and the range and ability of the players on the course. The guidelines below if adhered to will help ensure a reasonable pace of play:

On the Course

 All players must maintain their place in the field, which is immediately behind the group in front and not ahead of the group behind. This is a group responsibility and not an individual one. All members should be proactive in addressing the slow play problem.

- Should your group fall a clear hole behind (e.g., you are on the tee of a four or five par hole and the previous group has already left the green) and it is delaying the group behind please invite the group behind to play through (irrespective of the number of players in that group).
- If you hit a ball that you think may be hard to find, or it may be out of bounds, please hit a provisional ball to save having to walk back if the first ball can't be found.
- No more than **three** minutes is allowed to search for a ball. Be ready to call through if you can't find your ball within two minutes and proceed by enforcing the golf rules governing the conditions under which your ball was lost. If more than one ball needs to be found, split up and search for all the balls at the same time.
- Go to your ball and get ready to hit your next shot as soon as it is feasible, i.e., not impeding another player's shot or endangering yourself. Don't always wait for your playing partner to play before going to your ball (see Ready Golf below).
- Short hitters to tee off first
- Walking briskly between shot
- Leaving your golf bag, buggy or cart strategically placed to side of the green nearest the next tee.
- Cart users should be particularly aware of the extra time taken in sharing a cart and look for ways to speed up play, for example, move ahead of walkers to look for possibly lost balls, try to position the cart for easy access when leaving the green to reduce the number of times that you must get in and out.

On the Green

- When you reach the green, move to your ball and repair any pitch marks. Where
 possible, line up your putt prior to your turn to putt.
- If your ball needs to be marked, then do it as quickly as you can. Anticipate the requirements of your fellow players. Move back and line up your putt.
- Except in match play, and where you will stand on someone else's lie, when you start putting, continue until you have holed out. If playing stableford competition and you can no longer score on that hole, pick up your ball and let others continue.
- The first player to finish putting should take control of the flag and be ready to replace it in the hole when the final player has completed the hole.

- Players should proceed to the next tee without delay. The following group should be waiting to play their approach shots, so the path taken to the next tee should be borne in mind. Think ahead; leave your clubs in a place where you won't be hindering the following players.
- Cards should be marked as quickly as possible after completing the hole, but it is best to mark the cards at the next tee. Please mark your card when it is not your turn to play and remember, at all times your place in the field is immediately behind the group in front and not in front of the group behind.

Ready Golf

With more members and guests keen to play it is important that we all address 'pace of play' issues. A simple change is to play 'Ready Golf' on the course and on the putting green. Allowing players to play when they are ready to do so, rather than adhering strictly to the "farthest from the hole plays first" stipulation should be encouraged, except during match play games. Examples of ready golf include playing when someone in your group is assessing a tricky shot, shorter hitters playing first if longer hitters must wait and hitting a shot before helping someone to look for a lost ball. Another is putting out if you are not on someone's line.

Pitch Marks & Divots

We pride ourselves on the condition of our greens throughout the year. However, such playing surfaces can only be maintained if all golfers repair their pitch marks on the green. We would ask you to not only repair your pitch marks but ensure that all players within your group adhere to this policy — and look for another one to repair. Golfers are also responsible for the repair of all divot marks. If you make a divot, please replace it in its original location. The tee box is the only exception in which it is the greenkeeper's responsibility to cover divot marks.

Club Competitions are played all year round with Boards Competitions predominantly played from April through to September each year. We also hold a "winter pairs" competition from October to March. Main Club Competitions are played every Sunday and consist of a mixture of Medals and Stablefords.

The full fixture list is emailed out by the Competition Secretary. Medals, summer stablefords and trophy competitions are played off the White Tees. Winter stablefords, pro shop stablefords and winter pairs are played from the Navy tees.

Knock-out Competitions take place during the summer months with the finals in September, entry is required prior to the event. The player/team whose name (s) is on top of the draw will have responsibility for arranging the match and must provide at least 3 dates with at least one weekend option. Matches not completed by the closing date will be settled with the top name player going through.

Entry into a competition is via the competition noticeboard located by the driving range entrance or by emailing the Competition Secretary. Competition entry fee is paid into the pro shop prior to your round with competition winnings going onto your pro shop account as credit.

The club operates the Club V1 competition and handicap management system. On completion of your competition round, ensure that your handicap is written on your card, check the score on each hole, sign your card along with your marker, enter your score into the Touchscreen in the clubhouse, or via the Howdidldo app and place your card inside the competition scorecard box.

If you cannot play you must cancel your booking by contacting the Competition Secretary. This will allow other players looking for a tee time to book.

If you have a "no return" you should still enter your score in the computer. This is a mandatory requirement for the competition/handicap system. Failure corrupts the competition results and results in excessive time re-calculating the results of the competition.

The Club runs an Open week for members and visitors alike during August running over numerous days comprising of a different event each day.

The members have a Hole-in-One Club for Sunday competitions, payments of £3 to the pro shop entitle you to claim the pot to help cover the bar bill should you make a hole in one.

HANDICAPS

If you do not already have a handicap, you need to play three rounds and have your card signed by a WHS member with an "active handicap" and then submit them to the pro shop. Once you have been allocated a handicap you will be allocated a unique CDH (Central Database of Handicaps) number from England Golf. You will retain this throughout your amateur career and Lydd Golf Club will manage your handicap throughout. If you already have a handicap or have had a handicap at another club, you should provide us with details including your CDH number. If you wish your handicap to continue to be managed by your other club this can be done and you will be treated as an AWAY player at Lydd Golf. Your World Handicap System Index is automatically generated based on your best 8 scores from the last 20 games. If fewer than 20 scores are available to calculate a handicap Index, a sliding scale is used. For new golfers to gain their handicap Index, they must submit a minimum of 54 holes (using any combination of 9 and 18 holes on a measured course and by another player). For the purposes of the initial award of a Handicap Index two 9-hole scores are combined. The maximum hole score for new golfers is par +5 strokes, and holes not completed or scoring above this will be adjusted to par + 5.

During the months of October – March the Committee will conduct a handicap review of all home club players at the club. Adjustments may be made to players' handicaps based on results of reports from the WHS platform. The Committee advises players to have a maximum of 8 general plays in their last 20 handicap rounds. Players having more than 8 general play rounds in their last 20 rounds are ineligible to win club competitions and are more open to handicap adjustments should their average general play round scores be higher than their average competition scores.

LADIES SECTION

The Club boasts a 18 bay undercover, floodlit driving range with Toptracer installed in each bay to make Lydd Golf Club the perfect place to hone your skills and have fun.

Toptracer Range delivers the same ball-tracking technology that traces the shots of the game's best players on TV. Driving ranges equipped with Toptracer Range technology offer a fun, engaging, tech-driven experience that appeals to seasoned players, range rivals, friends, family members, and even first-time golfers. This comprehensive training mode allows guests to hone their skills by offering data such as distance (carry and total), ball speed, launch angle, height, side deviation, landing angle, hang time and distance to target.

COACHING

Our PGA professionals are available to book one-to-one including on-course sessions:

Member 30-minute lesson - £25 Member 1 hour lesson - £45 Members package, 5 x 30-minute lesson - £100 Member 9-hole (90 minute) lesson - £50

LOCKERS

The Club has lockers available to rent to hold your golf bags. These are available for £100 per year. The Club does not have storage for trollies.

BUGGIES

The Club has several buggies for hire at £25 per round for members or a buggy card of 10 rounds is available for £200. Personal buggies may be stored at the Club depending on availability and payment of £150 annual rental. The Manager's permission must be sought before bringing personal buggies onto the course.

CATERING

The Bar and Catering

Catering is available 7 days a week. Members will receive 10% discount on all food and drinks. Opening hours are from 7.00am to 9.00pm weekdays and 7.00am to 6.00pm weekends, throughout the playing season these hours may be increased. A pool table is available, and sport will be screened at times.

Social Events

The XIX Club holds several social events throughout the year but they will only be a success if members come and support them. Details of all events will be emailed to members and advertised in the Clubhouse.
